Course aim	
To familiarize the candidate with:	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - the basic anatomical and histological structure and physiological functions of the skin. - the basic pathohistological patterns of the most common dermatovenereological diseases. - the specific aspects of dermatovenereological anamnesis and physical examination and morphological aspects of skin lesions - efflorescences. - the clinical characteristics of the common, acute and urgent dermatovenereological conditions and skin lesions. - the diagnostic algorithms for the differentiation skin lesions and pigmented skin lesions, as well as the specific diagnostic procedures in dermatovenereology. - the specific topical and systemic therapy in dermatovenereology. 	
Expected outcome of the course:	
The candidate :	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - is familiar with the structure and functions of normal skin in all pigmentary types and with the principles of wound healing. - applies knowledge of the physiological structure and skin functions in the context of changes in human skin properties and functions in skin diseases and impaired wound healing. - applies knowledge of pathophysiology in considering differential diagnosis, diagnostic procedures and therapy of dermatovenereological diseases. - is able to take and present coherent dermatovenereological history of the patient with the rash or skin lesion. - is careful and sensible while interaction with the patient, shows empathy and involves the patient in treatment decisions. - is able to examine the skin, nails and mucosa systematically, to describe and to record physical signs, as well as to use appropriate terminology in order to describe and classify skin changes. - synthesizes information and provides an assessment in order to define most likely diagnosis and differential diagnosis. - assesses psychosocial impact of dermatovenereological condition and need for additional health support to patient. - is competent to recognize and describe common, acute and urgent dermatovenereological conditions (eczematous eruptions, psoriasis, aceniform eruptions, the most common and all “suspicious” lesions, skin infections and infestations, acute urticaria). - is competent to recognize and describe cutaneous manifestations of systemic diseases – paraneoplastic conditions; autoimmune disorders (such as vitiligo, alopecia areata), connective tissue disorders (lupus vasculitis); blood vessels diseases (venous and arterial ulcers, lymphedema). - is able to recognize common nail changes that are observed in common dermatoses and dermatoses associated with systemic diseases. - is able to structure a treatment plan and to rationalize therapeutic choice using evidence-based data presented in appropriate national and international guidelines. - is able to recognize and to independently initiate treatment of common dermatovenereological diseases and diagnostic procedures, as well as to assess the need to continue specialized dermatovenereological treatment and the need to include other specialties. - is able to independently assess a patient presenting with pruritus, recognising potential systemic causes and ordering the appropriate initial investigations - knows the principles of diagnosing and managing patients with the following acute and emergency presentations, including referral to appropriate specialties: acute (and chronic) urticaria (including papular urticaria / insect bites / stings), drug reactions including stevens-johnson syndrome / toxic epidermal necrolysis, extensive blistering eruptions, viral exanthems, erythroderma, necrotising fasciitis, generalised pustular psoriasis, eczema with secondary infection, staphylococcal scalded skin syndrome. - prescribe safely topical treatments accounting for potency, formulation, body site, adverse effects, interactions, contraindications including: emollients and soap substitutes, corticosteroids, antibiotics, antifungals, retinoids, therapies for parasitic infestations, therapies for actinic keratosis and Bowen’s disease - prescribe safely oral treatments accounting for indication, adverse effects, interactions, contraindications including: antibiotics, antifungals, corticosteroids - recognise the indications for and possible adverse effects of additional systemic therapies in the treatment of skin disease, such as retinoids, immunosuppressants and biological drugs

Treatment plan for acute and emergency conditions in dermatovenereology. 9. Treatment plan for patients suffering from psoriasis and atopic dermatitis 10. Treatment plan for patients suffering from viral, bacterial and fungal infections and from infestations. 11. Treatment plan for patients with skin melanocytic and non-melanocytic lesions 12. Treatment plan for patients suffering from acne and acneiform eruptions.
